# Chairman's note

As we edge towards the new normal of living with COVID-19 in our communities, I would like to share a little on how it has impacted the Levantine Heritage Foundation and our plans for the future.

When the LHF started almost 11 years ago, its strengths were the remarkable website that Craig Encer, our founder and General Secretary, had built and the small gatherings he had started to organise for people to share their family histories and research interests. Since then, the meetings have grown into larger talks, symposia and international conferences. These were rewarding for the sharing of research that provided context for independent and family researchers, and for the informal networking with people with a common interest.



For me, for example, there was the occasional exciting discovery of cousins who, while many times "removed" genealogically, seemed much more closely connected given our shared Levantine history.

Over the past 18 months or so, the website has continued to develop and expand, thanks to Craig's efforts and the generous collaboration of contributors to submissions, interviews and other content. The home page has been simplified and re-designed and we will gradually extend this through the site as time and resources permit. Its steadily growing archive of knowledge attracts numerous researchers, publishers and even filmmakers throughout the year who go on to seek further information and access to material from our network.

However, COVID put a stop to our in-person meetings, with the last in the UK being in January 2020. This has impacted the informal networking that many have enjoyed and benefited from over the years.

In response, we switched to online talks. Our friends and colleagues in Turkey set up the Association of the Levantines as an independent group and with the LHF's support also launched a series of Zoom talks in Turkish. Since November, together we have hosted 25 talks on a wide variety of subjects. They have attracted a good number of new speakers and participants and expanded our collective network internationally.

We are now planning for the future. We are keen to return to in-person talks as soon as conditions allow and to build in a stronger networking element around talks and themes. However, we will continue the programme of Zoom talks also. They bring together people from around the world at little or no cost and enable those who cannot easily travel into central points to participate in the LHF's activities.

Reflecting our international make-up, we will be less UK- and Turkey-centric and will support more events in other countries as resources allow. Historically, we have organised or participated in events in Athens, Turin,

Washington DC and Geneva, but there are several others places where members of the Levantine diaspora live and where academic research is centred. Next spring, we aim to organise an event in Paris. Others on our wish list include Amsterdam, Rome, Venice, Alexandria, Thessaloniki, New York, Marseilles and Beirut. If you are interested in helping coordinate an LHF event in your city or region, please get in touch so we can discuss a theme, venue and timing.

Our social media presence is growing on Twitter and Facebook, but there is more we could do to build awareness of the LHF as a leading organisation for knowledge on the heritage and culture of the Levant. We have yet to venture onto Instagram, for example. We have a rich collection of information and images we can use for social media posts, which would further the educational part of the LHF's mission. We are keen to hear from volunteers who would like to help, perhaps around a theme or a particular platform.

COVID-19 has been relatively neutral for our finances. Our costs are lower due to no travel or in-person events. But so too is our income, with fewer donations and limited membership subscriptions. The LHF receives no grants and is entirely reliant on the interest and generosity of its members and audiences. To grow and be able to fund new and bigger projects, we need to raise funds on a much greater scale. This needs focused effort, plus the support of those who can help open doors and perhaps even represent the LHF in presenting our story and case for funding. Lastly, we wish to develop this newsletter. It contains a lot of information about events, additions to the website and others' publications. It is also a way for researchers to publicise their work and seek input from others in the LHF's network. But we wish to add more short articles and reviews. ## Current research

#### Kaleb Herman Adney – <u>academic page:</u>

Kaleb Herman Adney seeks to collect primary-source materials on the Ottoman tobacco trade in Kavala and the nearby villages of Drama, Serres, Xanthi, and Genisea. He would also welcome any materials on companies operating out of Salonica, Istanbul, Trieste, Munich, or Vienna with connections to Thracian and Macedonian tobacco. His research is on the commercial networks, financial institutions, and socio-political organizing tactics of the region's tobacco merchants and cultivators. Many of the families who operated out of Kavala enjoyed European extraterritorial privileges and some of the most prominent among them were not subject to the same regulations and customs expectations that most merchants (and smugglers) were. The political connections, financial resources, and commercial networks of specific merchants therefore played a significant role in who succeeded and who did not with the late Ottoman tobacco trade.

Some of the particular names of individuals and companies that Herman is seeking further documentation on include (but are not limited to) the Allatini Brothers (especially Solomon) and their Salonica Cigarette Company as well as the Commercial Company of Salonica Ltd., John Jack (Djekis) Abbot, the Herzog Company and Tabacus, Juda Perahia, Petros Bulgarides, Haim Feraggi, Hasan Alif Pasha, Anton Velhikov, Elias Eliades, Kyros Anastasiades, Ismail Hakki Kobakizade, Lukas Grigoriades, Kiazim Emin, the murder of Hadji Georgiev (1909), the Kavala Tobacco Congress of 1911, and the Drama Tobacco Congress of 1910. In particular, if any members of the

Levantine Heritage community who have access to business papers or personal correspondence about regional tobacco production, finance, and commercial firms in the late nineteenth and twentieth centuries, references would be most welcome. Correspondence sharing potential leads would of course also be of use as would conversation via zoom, skype, or telephone.

#### Denny Hatton - Seeking help on information on the Rigo family

I am trying to learn more about one of my family lines. Their last name is Rigo. All this time we were under the impression they were French, either from Alsace/Lorraine, or Marseilles. The first Rigo to come to America was my great great grandfather, Francois Rigo, born 3 Aug 1859 in Constantinople. The family legend was that his father, Pierre Rigo, was a French diplomat on assignment to the Ottoman Empire when Francois and his brothers (Matthew, Alexander, Pierre, and Paul) were born. However, I cannot find any information about the father Pierre nor the mother, a Gabaret Calotian. In his naturalization petition to the United States I was able to find, Francois listed his citizenship as Turkish. In discussions with an expert on the French in the Ottoman Empire during that period, there is no record of Francois nor any of his brothers or father in the French consulate during that time. She also told me the Rigos were likely from Tinos, as that was a common name on the island.

I have no records of any of these Rigos other than Francois and his brother Paul, who also emigrated to the United States. The family story is that the mother, Gabaret Calotian, died in Constantinople in 1865 shortly after the birth of her last son, and with the father away in Izmir, the children were sent to a Catholic monastery.

Francois and Paul Rigo were devout Catholics, and claimed to be French. But at this point I don't know if they were actually French, or maybe they came to the Levant from France generations earlier, or even that they were never French at all, but rather raised/educated in the French manner by the Church? Were they Greek? Italian? Other? Were they from a family of Levantine merchants? Quite a mystery, and I would love to solve this if

possible.
