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- 2- The 1926 Newhall map has been used as base reference retaining the same positional numbers, no burial being permitted by this date, allowing me to see all eliminations (especially the 1991 clearance) and movement of head stones, which I suspect also date from the same time. Position 0 refers to the side of the church to where the 'railway graves' have been clustered. To reduce confusion no other positional numbers were devised and the nearest map numbers were referred to, even when they did not exactly correspond to the new position of the tombs.
- 3- 7 names seem to have been overlooked by Newhall and these are shown on the list with *.
- 4- There exists a short list of grave space purchase receipts starting from 1900 to 1925, after which as written in the book 'burials no longer allowed by order of the municipality. Of the 16 names listed we see a two (1902 Kate Lawson, Miss Shackleton 1920), marked on the map but invisible today giving me burial dates to add to the list.
- 5- Also from church files we find a certificate booklet of burials, which also contains a completely non-matching set of 13 names to either of the g.p.r. or map lists and strangely extending in date as reissues up to 1945 (20 years after burials no longer being allowed). This reissuing may have legal reasons as one grave of 1920 (S.W.Albon) was reissued with a certificate 3 times the same year. The non-matching of these names to present survey or Newhall's map may indicate these to be unmarked 'pauper' graves, due to uncertainty not included on list.
- 6- The railway graves on this list are listed under grave type as r.w. Graves not present on Newhall's map are denoted as X all of which are of railway type and initials only, 14 in number (+1unmarked). I'm not sure if these 'X' graves had been overlooked by Newhall or transferred since 1928 from elsewhere. However the fact that all railway graves with full names (13 in total) being marked suggests the latter were overlooked. The difference in rank may account for why some graves had full names, company and dates while others had initials only. All railway graves are small sandstone headstones and the clustering of grave dates

raises the possibility of some deaths due to work accidents, or disease as during the 1865 cholera epidemic, when 44 workers and 14 English engineers and technicians died le. Malaria was also a problem in those days. Not all these railway graves could have been workers as Jane Cox was a woman of 56, and Andrew Stanley a year old child at the age of death. The 'civilian' graves not marked on Newhall's map I've denoted as 'Y' (7 confirmed) which I suspect have been moved from other cemeteries.

- 7- The transcriptions of the text of the tombs, as well as tomb type descriptions have been done in detail by Sally Gallia and will be available in her report.
- 8- There are a total of 18 burials pre 1839 when burials were first allowed. Presumably these tombs (or remains) were transferred here from elsewhere.
- 9- Perhaps the most interesting grave stone details the events post-mortem of the body. Unfortunately broken in to many pieces when thrown with other slabs in to the Hönisher vault (N. pos.235), retrieved and pieced together on 7-10-2000 with pieces missing, the following text is decipherable.

..HAVING BEEN IMMERSED IN SPIRITS...C CASE WAS PLACED ON BOARD THE ...EAM SHIP 'JURA' FOR CONVEYANCE...N THE 20TH NOVEMBER .UT TWO DAYS ...TO A VIOLENT STORM CAPTAIN ...OMMITTED TO THE...EA OFF THE BAY ...VA ON THE 8TH DECEMBER, FOLLOWING. ...ASE WAS DISCOVERED IN PERFECT CONDITION ON THE S W CO...F THE ISL...180 MILES DISTANT, AND W...PLUNDERED AND THE BODY LE...BEACH BY THE NEIGHBOURING GR...BUT WAS FOUND AND BURIED ON ...TURK ON THE ...TH JANUARY THE ...NOT YET DECOMPOSED, W..RE ...TO SMYRNA AND BURIED HERE FEBRUARY 3 1879 She loved the poor whose sorrows she made her own and was deeply lamented by all around her

The lack of a name either points to the low likelihood of it being on a now missing piece or it being unknown, but presumably recognised as a European / Levantine from features or dress. However this possibility makes it difficult to account for who would bear the cost of a thick, large inscribed slab. The character reference may be factual or have a symbolic meaning. The exact dates and distances to the island given, points to testimony from the ships crew, who probably returned to Izmir after the storm. However it is not clear if the body was originally from Smyrna or whether the same ship brought back this body. Unfortunately my brief check at the Guildhall library, London, Lloyd listings on microfiche, did not reveal any further information on the movements of the 'Jura'. There are a number of ships bearing that name, however by date the most likely one is the one built in 1875 (Launched 28.8.75) at Connell & Co. Scotstoun Yard (much later Yarrow Shipbuilders Ltd) on the Clyde, for the Liverpool West India merchants Sandbach Tinne & Co. She was a sailing ship of 1285 tons gross. She was with the Company until foundering off Lima early 1908. There are internet references to this ship for example: When the Jura was launched in 1875, Capt. Russell left the Ailsa and took the new vessel. The Jura was a beautiful ship built specially for the coolie trade by Connell and Company, and Capt. Russell made some splendid passages in her. He died on board in 1895 just as the vessel was entering New York. Mrs. Russell Taylor, Lady Mayoress of Liverpool in 1921, was a daughter of Capt. Russell. This grave is catalogued as 'unknown', the other being a blank railway style tomb stone, there is no guarantee these 2 correspond to the 2 unknowns on Newhall's list.

10- The mistakes in spelling or confusing text points to the stone masons being non-English speakers, examples:

Poor instructions may also be responsible for the reason for the final digit of the death date being cut out. This points to an incorrect original date and the later replacement having subsequently fallen out, for example: W.G.Browning, died in Smyrna 31st of Oct. 187..

11- It appears that some families considered the cemetery as a place for a family plot showing their attachment to Buca. In some cases we know the body was brought over e.g. Thomas

- Bowen Rees junior who died in Greece. In other cases I suspect the grave was symbolic considering the distances and therefore the logistics and costs involved e.g. Second and third sons of Henry Edward and Susannah Rose, John Henry who died at Bakersfield, California and Edward who died at Aspinal, Panama respectively. This is to be later cross-checked with the burial records kept in London.
- 12- As noted from L.A. Missir's article no.2 & 3 the only grave that can be considered scholarly known is that of the German archaeologist George Weber (1841, died Buca 1910). Non-Levantine dying in Buca probably in a friend's house, published many articles on Ephesus etc. And according to the German Archaeological Institute in Istanbul (Wolfgang Ratz) the same person did also detailed measurements and study of the Roman aqueduct system around Izmir (Yeşildere, Kızılçullu etc.) Unfortunately his and his wife's grave is presently non-existent.
- 13- From the 1905 city plan we can ascertain the nature of business where names and nature of store is indicated. Of the cemetery names a few are listed; Hönisher, has unspecified warehouses and as dry fruit and grain storehouses P.G. Barff (1835-1926) and Whittall & Co. (Bornova based) are indicated. Additionally from publications we can ascertain: William Griffitt (1815-1908), had a wool processing factory at Daragaç (north end of Punta) still in operation in 1933^{1d-p.167}, Edward Keyser was involved in banking in the latter part of the 19th century.
- 14- From the summer 1951 edition of the church magazine 'Candlesticks' we learn that at the time there was an effort to record headstones and contact descendants, by the church secretary, as 'Miss Routh has diligently compiled a list of graves in the churchyard, and our efforts to trace the next of kin with a view to maintenance has met with a good response. However in the surviving archives the list is present but no trace of the list or communications were found.
- 15- Where we only have surname matches there is a danger in assuming family links. This being said the smallness of the community would mean most assumptions should hold. Thus examining the listing of British consuls of Izmir^{1f-App3}, we can see the 'entrance' of some surnames to the local scene. George Boddington serving 1722-33 was possibly the father of Margaret Willis (1760-1808) and Robert William Cumberbatch (serving 1864-1876, died in office) was probably the father of Alice Maud (1868-9) and Robert Carlton (1855-68) C.

The above list is only intended to act as a rough indicator of the size of the various families present in an around Buca and their minimum residence periods, however these have to be taken into consideration:

- 1- Deaths amongst the young were frequent and probably not evenly spread across families.
- 2- Not all burials took place here necessarily as other alternative cemeteries were always present
- 3- Not all burials may have had a tombstone or at least one that survived till 1928.
- 4- Some families with the means may have transported their dead abroad, maybe even to England.
- 5- Not all families stayed in Buca long enough to record a burial.
- 6- Some families stay in Buca may have included the period pre 1839 or post 1925, thus any deaths could not be seen as burials here.
- 7- Many families did and do have members resident in Bornova and a proper appraisal of 'residence period' would be based including the records of these and other cemeteries, such as Audrey Maltass and Edgar Gout who are buried in Bornova in 1982 and 1946 respectively.
- 8- It should not be forgotten that all the old Levantine families are interrelated thus surnames are only relevant as far as tracing the male line.

Not all the burials represent the Buca community, some could be passing visitors, whereas the others may give clues to the location of smaller Levantine communities and with other evidence point to possible fields of trade of the men-folk.

PROFESSIONS OF SOME OF THE MORE PROMINENT MEMBERS SURMISED

From the text on many tombstones we are able to tell the profession of many deceased (sometimes through the tombstone of their wife, eg: William Wilkin was the director of the Ottoman bank). The table below highlights some of the occupations derived through alternative sources thus helping to better show the economic and skill contribution of these Levantines to Turkey at the time.

The above table shows that the long period of lack of ownership of cemetery has had a considerable effect, with a $1/5^{th}$ of the graves being lost and nearly half no longer in their original position.

The 'pre-legal' burials probably represent remains (with or without tombstones) brought over from other cemeteries.

The 'bulge' in numbers of burials between 1861 and 1880 should not be taken as firm evidence as the most populace time of the Buca Anglo-Levantines but clearly an average of 5-6 burials a year during this period would reflect a considerable standing population.

To rectify weathering and vandal damage I organised a repair team to perform the following tasks: 1-Poisoning of trees threatening foundation of church or some tombs.

- 2- Wire brushing of lichen covered graves only if illegibility results (under trees).
- 3- Gluing with resin or cementing together broken slabs.
- 4- Moving crosses back to their original pedestals and headstones only if light enough and original position, determined from map, is vacant.

From the few photos displayed in F. Erpi's book, I can see some damage to tombstones post that date (1987), thus not all desecration took place in the 1970's, the details:

The tombstones lined along the SE wall are also visible in one of the 1987 photos (193 /5), thus the front clearance happened in at least 2 phases.
